

STUDENTS ACHIEVE MORE

35.8%

In the term before they transferred to Polaris Junior students earned just over one third of the credits they attempted.

83.7%

In the first quarter enrolled at Polaris these same students passed over 80% of their classes.

STUDENTS ATTEND MORE

76.5%

Before transferring to Polaris nearly three quarters of students were chronically absent from school (missing more than 10% of their classes whether excused or not).

50.9%

In the first quarter enrolled at Polaris these same students passed were significantly more likely to attend school cutting the chronically absent rate by a third.

What is the School Community Council

The School Community Council (SCC) is made up of Parent, Teacher, and Administration representatives. The purpose of the Council is to provide guidance in the governance of the school. School Improvement Plan

Each year, Utah Schools develop a School Improvement Plan (SIP) which is a roadmap for school staff to use as they strive to improve Teaching and Learning in their schools.

The Polaris High School SIP for the 2014-2015 school year consists of the following goals:

School Land Trust Accounting

Polaris High School received \$13,705 for the 2014-15 school year that was used in support of the School Improvement Plan goals.

Computers and Chromebooks have been purchased and ongoing professional development activities have been provided and more are scheduled through the coming year.

During the first semester, our students have earned over 225 academic credits accessing the East Shore High curriculum.
