


LAND Trust Funds

Last year, ATEC's School Community Council (SCC) used \$14,111 in LAND Trust Funds for student reading, employment, and technology skills, by purchasing library books, iPads, and establishing essential elements and curriculum in employment skills.

The iPads have helped students become more engaged in classroom and online instruction and exploration of employment opportunities.

Purchasing high interest library books through student requests, has increased book check-outs 20% from the 2016-17 to the 2017-18 school years.

ATEC's Mission:

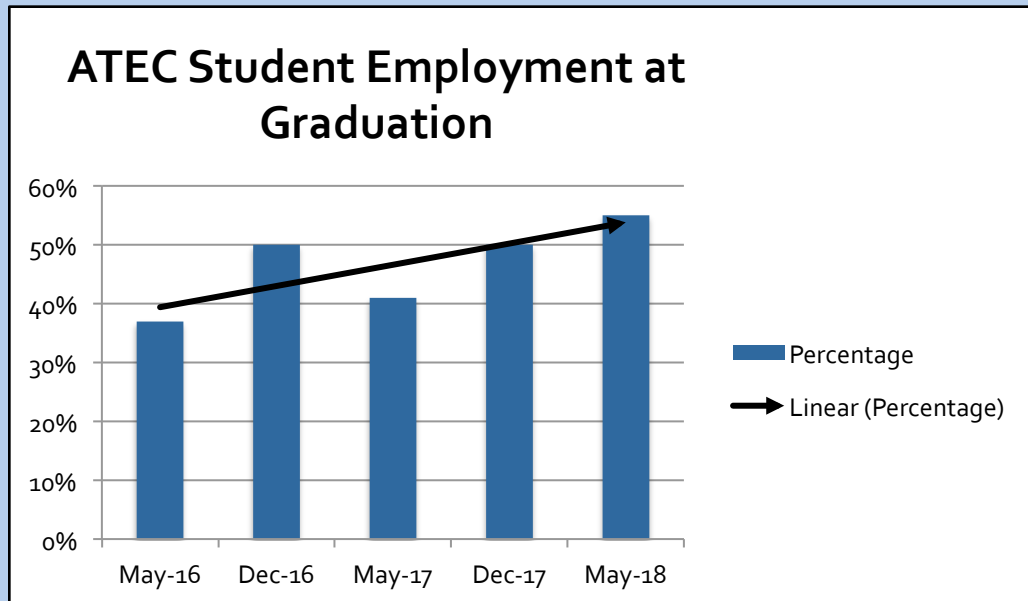
To create a safe and supportive environment where students, ages 18-22, can learn transition skills to navigate and access their individual adult life.
