College Readiness

Our goal is to see 100% of our student body enrolled in a college level class. This includes Advanced Placement classes, concurrent enrollment classes that earn Alpine District and UVU credit at the same time, Distance Ed, and MATC courses taken during high school. We believe the best way to be ready for college is to have a college experience while in High School.

Positive Relationships

The strength of Mountain View comes from a strong relationship between students and adults. Last year's report gave survey results that placed MV at the top in the district in all questions that involved school environment and student/adult relationships. We continue to place an emphasis on hiring teachers and staff who love working with high school students. We believe that all students can learn at high levels and that it is our responsibility to ensure that they do.

Extra-Curricular Activities

We want every student to be involved with one of our clubs, activities, competition groups, or sports. We offer at least 62 different extra-curricular opportunities including:

- 20 Student Clubs (9 are new this year)
- 6 Career and Technical Organizations
- 2 Chapters of National academic organizations

- 16 sanctioned sports programs

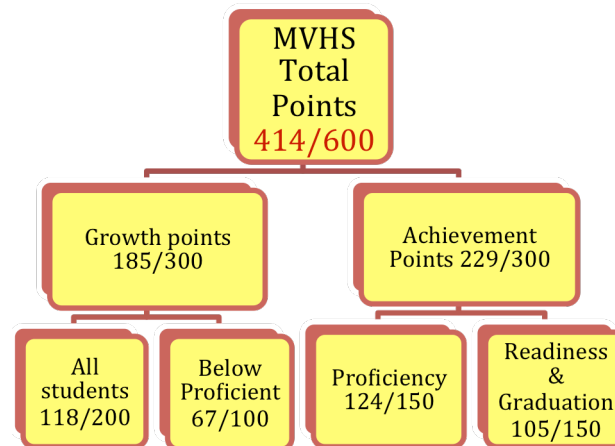
Achieve

Someone famous once said, "The world will pay you what it things you are worth." For that reason, we are committed to achieving the goal of seeing 100% of our students graduate from high school and go on to training or education beyond high school. We firmly believe that the more education and training a student receives, the more opportunities they will have in life to pursue their goals and dreams.

Utah Comprehensive Accountability System

In response to recent legislation, the Utah State Office of Education has developed a new report card for all Utah schools. The system consists of a total of 600 points that are split between Achievement (including end of course scores and Graduation for high schools) and Growth. 300 points come from achievement and 300 points come from growth. Growth scores are calculated by comparing each student to students across the state that have scored very similar in a subject area over the last two years. Thus it compares students to other like students.

We were pleased to learn that Mountain View received **414 out of 600** possible points. This places us around the state average of all of the high schools in the State of Utah. In the flow chart below, you will see that Mountain View received **185 out of 300** points on the growth component of scoring and **229 out of 300** points on the achievement component.



Advanced Studies

- 88% of AP tests taken at MVHS were passed in 2013. That compares to 83% in 2012. This significantly outperforms the state average of 67%, and the national average of 59%.
- MVHS students also earned more concurrent enrollment credit per student than any other high school in Alpine District.
- More Juniors participated in the ACT test than in any other year at MV.

Trustlands Funding

One of the major responsibilities of the Mountain View Community Council is to allocate State Land Trust money designated specifically to improve student achievement in schools. Many of the programs, interventions, and training that we are able to provide are possible because of this funding.

IN 2013-14 we received \$74,219. Our plans for expenditures this year include:

- Supporting the FLEX and Study Skills programs by hiring a facilitator for both programs.
- Supporting a Credit Recovery program by hiring a facilitator to run this class.
- Providing an ACT Prep class for both the fall and spring semesters.
- Purchasing technology in the form of 17 projectors to be mounted in classrooms, and the Mastery Connect on-line program.
- Providing funding for teachers and administrators to attend the Professional Learning Communities Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah.
